Dear Governor Newsom:

I write to urge you to sign into law [AB 338](#), which would allocate California Workforce Development Board funds for Los Angeles County Department of Economic Opportunity for, among other things, workforce development strategies, including stipends for underemployed and unemployed low- to moderate-income individuals to ensure a skilled and sufficient workforce for the scale of rebuilding and recovery of areas in the Counties of Los Angeles and Ventura impacted by the 2025 wildfires.

As the voice of all things work, workers, and the workplace, [SHRM](#) is the foremost expert, convener, and thought leader on the issues and innovations shaping today's workplaces. With nearly 340,000 members in 180 countries, SHRM directly impacts the lives of more than 362 million workers worldwide. SHRM California State Council connects all 16 local SHRM chapters with our regional and national organizations, uniting nearly 30,000 members across the state.

Our research confirms what many employers are experiencing every day: labor shortages and skills gaps are among their greatest challenges. The SHRM 2023–2024 [State of the Workplace Report](#) found that 65% of organizations cited concerns over access to talent. Similarly, our [2025 Talent Trends Survey](#) shows that seventy percent of employers are still reporting difficulties recruiting for full-time regular positions, on par with 2016 — with 39% pointing to lack of work experience and 33% citing insufficient technical skills in applicants.

A skilled workforce is the cornerstone of success in today's globalized economy, yet the U.S. labor market faces a growing skills gap. While there are about 7 million open jobs, new graduates struggle to enter the workforce. Traditional four-year degrees remain valuable while interest in alternative pathways to work grows.

AB 338 would help individuals develop critical skills that address an urgent need for communities devastated by this year's wildfires. In many cases, these individuals become gainfully employed more quickly and earn more than those with an associate degree alone, becoming productive members of the community, address the workforce shortages that California is facing and helping families, businesses and communities return to a sense of normalcy.
